Special Presentations. Several interesting and informative presentations are under consideration including officiating on an international stage (from an athlete's perspective); responding to interpersonal conflict as an athletics official (more like Mother Theresa, less like the Unabomber); and proposed changes to the officiating pathways (mentoring, etc.).

The National Mentoring Program

The roll-out of the National mentoring program is scheduled for later this Fall. We are soliciting interested officials who are level 3 to 5 who would like to be included in a pool of mentors who will work with mentees in their officiating career. We will start mentoring with Level 1 and 2 officials before moving on to higher level officials. We ask all interested officials to complete a self-assessment checklist which will be available on the Officials website under Newsletters and Meetings after October 1. Please download, complete and send to brian.thomson@shaw.ca by November 1, 2019. Workshops for mentors will be delivered in the Interior, Lower Mainland and Vancouver Island later this Fall or early 2020.

Note: not all interested mentors will be assigned to mentor level 1 and 2 officials starting in 2020. We will want to save some mentors for mentoring officials at levels 3 through 5. All current National Mentors will continue with their current role as evaluators of officials wishing to upgrade. A new NOC program for Evaluators will be rolled out in the next 1-2 years at which point Evaluators will be selected and trained in the new program.

In Touch

We received this note about the Retirement of a well-respected and much-admired Coach whom many of the BC Vertical Jumps Judges and Referees have worked with over the past, many years.

Since 1966, Gerard Dumas has been central to the development of pole vault athletes in the Greater Victoria area. Gerard Dumas is the original and longest-serving coach as he has been with the Club since 1966 (in its first form as the Victoria Track and Field Club). Gerard was born and educated in France before coming to Canada in the early 1960s, where he served as a sprint and hurdle coach with Victoria High School and the YMCA. He was the Head Coach for the University of Victoria (UVIC) until 1979, when UVIC cancelled its full track and field program.

Gerard has been a full-time pole vault coach since 1975, coaching a number of Canadian champions and age-class Canadian record holders. His athletes have competed internationally in the Pan Am Games, Commonwealth Games and the Francophone Games. Raul (Paul) Estrada, one of Gerard's elite vaulters, qualified for the Moscow Olympic Games in 1980, but did not attend as the Games were boycotted by Canada and many other countries. Owen Clements was the 1994 Canadian Champion in the pole vault, and represented Canada at the 1994 Commonwealth Games.

Of special note, Gerard has steered numerous young male and female high school athletes to the pinnacle of success in the BC High School Championships, where about 30% of the medallists over the years have been a product of his Victoria PV program. As an athlete himself, Gerard originally competed for France at international meets and was French National Champion in 1952 before his move to Canada in the early 1960s. For the next decade, Gerard the athlete was in the top 10 pole vaulters in Canada. He still competes as a masters athlete having over 1200 pole vault competitions in his 72 years of competitive pole vaulting.

Recently, in 2016, he was recognized with the Lifetime Achievement Award as Coach of the Year, at the National Pole Vault Summit, which is the premier developmental conference established to promote the advancement of Pole Vaulting at all levels through constant education of the world's best athletes and coaches. From grassroots to the very elite of the world, the Pole Vault Summit's recognition is a testament to Gerard's selfless years of dedicated coaching.

We look forward to Gerard's continued involvement as an athlete...which in itself must be a world record for number of years vaulting. As a side note – Gerard was indeed competing in Pole Vault at the BC 55+ Games in the 80+ age category.

The Athletics Victoria board of directors want to thank him for his many, many years of service to the athletes of Victoria and to the broader pole vault community.
